Lipscomb University Engineering Team Works on Sanitation & Filtration System

The summer of 2018 was busy with numerous activities on the campuses of Village of Hope. Village of Hope hosted some groups from the United States who came to serve and be a blessing to the entire Village of Hope community.

From May 15 to 30 two groups from **Lipscomb University** in Nashville, Tennesse visited the Fetteh campus. The first group made up of students and staff of the university were engaged in teaching reading to children with learning difficulties. In the past these children were part of the mainstream school but after we identified their peculiar challenges in learning they were given special attention. The Lipscomb group focused on building the children's confidence and tutoring them to improve academically. They also engaged the children in spiritual activities and spent a lot of time in many fun activities with them. The second group from Lipscomb were mainly from the Raymond B. Jones College of Engineering. They engaged the students of Hope College (our senior high school) in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) activities. The students were really delighted with the science experiments they conducted, especially the building and shooting of rockets.

The **Lipscomb engineering team** made a lasting impact on Village of Hope by constructing a prototype sanitation and filtration system on the Fetteh campus to help treat liquid waste water. This longawaited project has taken a couple of years to become a reality. It started with teams from Lipscomb University visiting, surveying, conducting various tests and designing the sanitation and filtration system. Finally, it was time to build the system and the team spent two grueling weeks digging trenches, laying pipes, mixing and casting concrete,

Rainstorms Cause Havoc to Properties at Hope College



The period between May and July is known in Ghana as the rainy season. Most of the rainfall within the year occurs at this time. As with weather patterns, some years experience heavier rains than others. This year was one of the years with exceptionally large volumes of rainfall. However, this year's rains came in the company of very strong winds. For the first time in the history of Village of Hope, the rainstorms ripped off part of the roofing of the Practical Education Building of Hope College. These storms also caused extensive flooding of parts of the Hope College campus, damaging some properties in the school's kitchen.

The flood cut off the college from the rest of the Village of Hope campus for a day. Thankfully the waters receded quickly and things came back to normal. ()

The access road to the Hope College campus was also blocked and a few trees were uprooted. Part of the roof of the practical education building was blown off, and the kitchen and dining hall of Hope College was flooded.











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
