Over 2,000 Christians Gather at Fetteh Campus of Village of Hope



Gathering of Campers on Village of Hope Campus

Members of churches of Christ in Ghana gather for camp meetings during the end of each year. They take advantage of the public holidays around the Christmas period which are also holidays for schools and for numerous workplaces to organize camp meetings for Christian fellowship and for the edification of the saints. Several congregations in Ghana organize such camps for either the entire church or for the youth of the church. The largest and one of the oldest of such camp meetings is jointly organized by the Asafo and Oforikrom churches of Christ – two large congregations in Kumasi, Ghana's second largest city.

Known as the Annual National Bible Camp, it has been organized at various towns and cities across Ghana over the past 36 years. It brings together Christians from all over Ghana for several days of Christian fellowship.

The 36th Annual National Bible Camp was hosted by the Village of Hope at its Fetteh campus from December 21 to 25, 2018 under the theme "Christian Commitment." The opening keynote lecture was on the topic "Commitment, A Mark of Christian Citizenship" and was delivered by Kofi Tawiah, minister of the Osu church of Christ in Accra. preacher of the Asafo church of Christ in Kumasi on "Commitment Towards Preachers' Welfare." Alexander Maxwell Yawson, minister of the Winneba church of Christ presented the third keynote on "Commitment to Church Cooperation." The final keynote on "Commitment to Nation Building" was by Fred Asare, minister of the church of Christ at Village of Hope who is also the Executive Director of the Village of Hope. That keynote also served as the sermon for the Sunday morning worship service.

Various classes were held for children, teenagers, singles, married couples and single parents. There were various activities including drama, Bible quiz competitions, devotionals, games and site-seeing. By the end of the camp meeting, 33 souls had been baptized into Christ. The campers also collected free-will contributions and donated a total of ten thousand and six hundred Ghanaian cedis (GHS 10,600) which is equivalent to two thousand, two hundred and eight American dollars (US\$ 2,208) to the Village of Hope. That was truly a kind gesture of love.

Medical Missions by Team from

Since 2004, some members of the church of Christ at White Station in Memphis, Tennessee have been conducting annual outreach mobile clinics in the towns and villages near the Village of Hope campus in Fetteh. Most of those who participate are medical professionals – doctors, dentists, physical therapists, nurses, etc. but non-medical professionals also participate. They help to maintain order, teach and preach the gospel and work hard in diverse ways to make each mobile clinic a success.

How time flies!!! January 2019 marked the 16th year of the White Station church of Christ Medical Missions in Ghana. From January 15 to 18, 2019, this year's medical missions team, together with staff of Hope Christian Hospital and some college students of Village of Hope worked in five villages where they treated a total of 856 people as follows:

Nsuekyir = 195

Worabeba = 230

Gyahadze & Gyangyanadze = 250

Kweikrom = 181

In addition to this number, the eye clinics that were part of the medical clinics treated an average of 50 patients in each village, bringing the total number of people treated over the four-day period to over one thousand.

We thank God for the lives of all those who have travelled to Ghana or have made it possible for others to travel to Ghana and have supported in diverse ways through the years such as the provision of medicines, medical supplies, equipment and money to enable the workers provide much needed healthcare to the sick and educate entire rural communities on good healthcare practices and preventive measures to ward off diseases. The love of God has been shown and souls have been converted to Christ.
