# **PROGRESS AT VILLAGE OF HOPE – BONGO**

ur newest ministry is the churches of Christ's children's home in Bongo in the Upper East Region of Ghana, where Village of Hope is now tasked with serving the neediest children in the northernmost part of the country. Village of Hope - Bongo is now home to 15 children and has a staff strength of seven. Matthew Akanwunge is our security man; Lawrence Baah, our administrator, and his wife Ernestina Baah are house parents; Felix Ayambilla, our social worker, and his wife Joyce are also house parents; Rebecca Abanei is a caregiver; and Roger Ayillah, a preacher of the church of Christ in Bolgatanga, the capital of the Upper East Region, serves as the chaplain of the children's home.

For over a year, most of the children at Bongo had not been to school because of COVID-19. After Village of Hope took over management of the children's home, it was necessary to find for our children a school better than the one they were attending before the pandemic hit; therefore, about two months ago, all the children wrote placement tests at a school in Bolgatanga to determine their grade levels. Although there are several schools in Bongo, the quality of education we desire for the children will not be obtained from those schools, hence, management's decision to seek better quality in the capital city, only 20 minutes from Bongo. After passing the tests successfully, all the children have been admitted to various grades at Desert Pastures International School.

It was pure joy for both staff and children as 13 of the children donned their new school uniforms and new shoes, carried their new backpacks and books, and boarded a rented van for the 20-minute drive from Bongo to Bolgatanga on May 4, 2021. This was a great feat as the children had been home for 14 months without formal education. Our oldest girl (Florence) is in 9th grade and had to stay with her current school in Bongo to write the national exams this November. Our youngest boy (Ephraim) is not ready for school yet and so stays at home with his parents.

Over the past five weeks, the children have been engaged in both academic and extra-curricular activities at school. In the evenings, their chaplain engages all the eleven girls and four boys in Bible lessons to nourish their souls in preparation for a life of eternity with Jesus. Please remember to include the children of Bongo and the adults directly responsible for them in your prayers.



# **UPDATE FROM FETTEH HOMES**

t truly takes a village to raise the children of Village of Hope across all our ministries. At Fetteh, the core team that makes the daily care and upbringing of the children possible is made up of the house parents who provide parental care and nurturing to these children.

Currently, the family snapshots at any given time hardly ever include every single child that we care for. Apart from our babies and the children at our new campus in Bongo, there are 222 children being provided for, in some form, through your support of the orphanage. This number keeps changing as new children are admitted and others graduate from their various educational and training programs.

At the moment, 84 of these children, comprising 45 boys and 39 girls, live on the Fetteh campus and study at Hope Christian Academy. The house parents are on call for these children 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The remaining 138 are non-residential and go to various schools across the country, including Hope College and Hope Training Institute. Here are the details of the distribution of our children.

## 9TH AND 12TH GRADERS PREPARE FOR NATIONAL EXAMINATIONS

While the school breaks caused by COVID-19, the national academic calendar has changed in Ghana. This year, the 12th graders will write their exam from August to October and the 9th graders will follow in November. At Hope College, 173 students are preparing for what will be a major contributing factor to the rest of their education and career path. At Hope Christian Academy, there are 45 pupils who will take the Basic Education Certificate Examination (BECE) in November. The number of examination candidates at Hope

Christian School is six. All these 224 children are taking periodic mock examinations at school, followed by remediation by their teachers for the areas that they may still have difficulties. Meanwhile, the younger children in the lower classes have no idea that a national exam exists and they are busy with their arts and crafts.

Please pray for all our 224 students with upcoming examinations, that their futures would be impacted positively by the outcomes of these pending examinations.
