The Village of Hope family gathered, in person and online, with friends in the United States, on the afternoon (in Ghana) of August 21, 2021, to take part in the dedication ceremony of a new music studio generously funded by Renai McClanahan and her family. The space for the music studio has existed in the Hackmann Practical Education Building of Hope College for a few years but the actual equipment required had not been purchased until the generous gift from this family was received.

The studio was named in memory and in honor of Anna Beth Daugherty Knight, mother of Renai McClanahan and her siblings. Here, in Renai's words, is a glimpse into the life of Anna Beth Daugherty Knight and why her descendants chose to support the music studio project at the Village of Hope:

Our family was honored in August to attend the virtual dedication of the new music studio at Hope College in memory of our mother, Anna Beth Daugherty Knight. Born in the small town of Seminole, Texas, Anna was often bothered by allergies brought on by the dry, sandy, hot wind of west Texas. So that she might stay healthy, her parents bought a piano to give her something to do inside. She learned to play as a young child, and in grade 4, she also learned to play violin in school. Though she only played violin for a couple of years, she continued playing piano. After graduating valedictorian of her high school, Anna attended Abilene Christian College, now Abilene Christian University, where she studied English literature, Bible and piano. There she met her husband, Bill, who shared her love of music. Anna was smart and disciplined, graduating in just three years.

She and my father married soon after her graduation and moved to Florida, eventually moving back to Texas where thev raised their three children. Though Anna could have pursued many careers, she chose what she considered the most noble of careers, that of being a mom and a support and helper to her husband, making a wonderful home for us. During our younger years, our mom taught piano in our home where she also taught my sister and me to play. As life became busier, she gave up teaching and would only

occasionally be heard playing. But her love of music was never lost. As my siblings and I grew and had music opportunities in school, she supported our interests by driving us to countless lessons and rehearsals and always attending our concerts with our dad. I took several years of piano lessons, and my sister, brother and I would all go on to play violin. In fact, I still play in the local orchestra and have done so for 31 years, all because of my parents' love of music.

The greatest love in our mom's life, however, was for her God and Savior. She could be found for many years teaching the toddlers' and two-yearolds' bible classes, working in the nursery, overseeing Vacation Bible School, mentoring young mothers, even sewing and sending bandages to African hospitals. Until just months before her passing in 1999, she continued teaching many ladies the Bible as she had done through the years. God was her constant, her foundation, the source of her peace and joy; His Spirit was her guide; and Jesus was her friend and companion in all things. Truly, her every choice, decision and action was preceded by prayer and directed by her faith.

We believe our mom would be thrilled to see the students at Hope College be given the opportunity to further experience the special language God gives us through music. It is our hope, too, that many will enjoy the music studio and will find ways to honor God through the music made there.

Many thanks to all who made this such a special occasion for our family. We know much time and effort was put into making it happen. And a special thank you to all of the students for your beautiful singing. As you sang, I could only think, as I do every time we've been blessed to sing with you at VOH, how amazing Heaven's chorus will be!

All of us at Village of Hope also say a big "thank you" to the entire family of Anna Beth Knight Daugherty for continuing the legacy of their matriarch thousands of miles away. The euphoria and the celebrations from pupils and staff of the school tell all that we have received an amazing and precious gift from God. The school is half-way through the solution to its furniture needs. Classrooms that were supplied with these tables and chairs look appealing and welcoming for teaching and learning.

In the process of us refurnishing our classrooms, the Nkwatia Methodist Basic School, a school that shares a boundary with Hope Christian School, also had its fair share of God's kindness because, once we had sorted out our old furniture, management of Hope Christian School presented some of the wooden chairs and tables to the Methodist school. In fact, that school has also been battling with inadequate classroom furniture for a while. What a day of rejoicing it was to be receiving and giving out!

We are forever grateful for the generous donations of kind-hearted individuals in and outside Ghana who are writing their names on the hearts of people rather than on marbles. It is our constant prayer that the marvellous grace of our loving Father abound unto all our donors in every endeavour they pursue. had been praying fervently for both of them as they were lying in their hospital beds, miles away from each other, but somehow connected because of Village of Hope. One of them, Karen, had always been a mother figure to the entire Village of Hope family; the other, Kwadwo, had been a son of Village of Hope for just about a year.

As news got to us that each of their medical teams were not seeing improvements, we continued, individually and collectively, to pray for the best.

On Sunday, September 12 in Olathe, Kansas, USA (already Monday, September 13 in Accra, Ghana), the answer came. God had decided that it was time for both Karen and Kwadwo to come home and so, within a short space of time, he called them both. As much as it makes our hearts heavy, as children of God, we know and believe that they have merely let go of this fleshly garment and moved on to a better place for eternity.

The children and staff of Village of Hope never met Karen Chisholm but they knew her name. She was the "Karen" in the Tom and Karen Chisholm Computer Laboratory. She was the wife of Tom Chisholm, which meant that, for many years, she was, in principle, one of our mothers; however, this was also true in practice as was demonstrated by the consistent support she gave to the children of Village of Hope in diverse ways, especially in the area of selecting, buying, and packing supplies to be shipped to Ghana. Karen was truly passionate about mission work in Ghana and she hosted many people connected with many of the church-related missions in Ghana including Heritage Bible Institute, Rural Water Development Project, and Village of Hope.

Kwadwo Fosu is the boy who was featured in the cover story of the September 2020 edition of Herald of Hope. His mother had abandoned him at three months old; his father had died later; his grandmother was bedridden. At the age of eight, he did not have parents; he was malnourished; he was ill; he had never been to hospital; he had never used a toothbrush before. One day, Kwadwo was lying on the ground dirty and almost at the point of death. A kind passerby, Kwame Bannor, saw him, had pity on him, and initiated the process that eventually brought Kwadwo to Village of Hope. He was immediately admitted at the hospital for a number of days, and it was there that it was determined that he had a heart condition that should have been treated during the very early months of his life. He became one of the children under the constant watch of the medical personnel of the hospital. George and Cynthia Arthur became his parents, and cared for him with so much patience and love.

It was God's will for to Kwadwo spend the last year of his life feeling loved and cared for and we can only count ourselves blessed to part of that last year of his life until he passed away after a few days at the Korle-Bu Teaching Hospital in Accra.

On Monday, September 20, we started the morning at Fetteh with a short service to say goodbye to Kwadwo Fosu. Kwadwo's classmates from preschool, the boys from his home, house parents, administrative staff, teachers and hospital staff gathered in front of the George and Mary Chisholm House, where Kwadwo lived, to sing and pray and comfort each other. Kwame Bannor, the good Samaritan who found Kwadwo in his moment of despair, also joined us. The adults continued to the Fetteh cemetery to bury Kwadwo Fosu. Later that same day (morning in Olathe), those who were able, joined the memorial service for Karen Chisholm online.

We are grateful to God for giving us Karen to show us a mother's love, and for giving us Kwadwo to teach us how to love. Heaven has gained two angels who are now free from any physical pain. May God comfort us all.⁽¹⁾

CHILDREN OF VILLAGE OF HOPE VISIT THEIR RELATIVES

For all of 2020, and half of 2021, none of the residential children of Village of Hope, as required by law, spend at least one school holiday with any available, living relatives. The purpose of this is to keep the connection with their biological extended family alive. For all of 2020, and half of 2021, none of the residential children of Village of Hope could leave Fetteh partly because of COVID-19 restrictions. They had, therefore, not seen any of their relatives in almost two years. This year, it was decided that a visit to relatives was in order so, after Hope Christian Academy went on break on July 30, the relatives started showing up at Fetteh to take the children home for a full month. The 9th graders, however, had to stay for a couple of weeks to finish mock examinations before they could leave. The only children left on campus were a few recently admitted children, and the biological children of our house parents. Suddenly, the Village of Hope campus was extremely quiet and we could not hear the shouts and laughter of little children. We welcomed all of them back on September 3, just in time for classes at Hope Christian Academy to commence on September 6. Life is back to normal until the next long school holiday.

With the experience Emmanuel gained from the internship, soon after high school, he transitioned to working on his own from his grandmother's home where he lives with his sisters and grandmother.

In August, the Melson family generously provided Emmanuel with a new laptop computer whose performance is suitable for his graphic design work. Emmanuel is also a great soccer player and his sponsors support him wholeheartedly. We are grateful to the Melsons for giving Emmanuel this boost that will help him work to assist his grandmother who can no longer bake bread and relies primarily on the benevolence of others.
