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AN UPDATE ON OUR CHILDREN

It is a blessing whenever we pause to look back and realize the positive changes that are happening in the lives of our children. It seems like one day a child is in elementary school and, before you know it, that child is about to start college. We are continually thankful to everyone who has joined us in this labor of love and continues to support these precious children to become mature adults.

As of February 2022, as Village of Hope celebrates 26 years of saving lives and serving humanity, we would like to share some statistics and facts with you, to let you know how your contributions are making a difference.

Our children's home in Bongo, in the Upper East Region of Ghana, is now called Hope Children's Place. At Hope Children's Place, there are 14 residential children comprising seven boys and seven girls. Hope Children's Place also takes care of four non-residential children in high school and college. One of the high school students from Bongo actually completed ninth grade recently and is now attending Hope College.

At the Fetteh campus, 85 children are being

cared for on a daily basis in the seven residential homes and the babies' home of Hope Children's Village. Apart from the babies who have not yet started school, all the other children attend Hope Christian Academy and, God-willing, will do so until they transition into high school. Hope Children's Village also provides support to four other children who are in elementary schools around the country, while they live with their families.

The next group of people who are cared for by Hope Children's Village, because of your generous gifts, are the 40 teenagers and young adults who have been able to continue their formal education, after graduating from Hope Christian Academy, at various high schools. Four of them are in several high schools around the country while the remaining 36 are at Hope College.

Another 16 of our young ones are learning various trades and vocational skills under apprenticeships, in vocational institutes, and at our own Hope Training Institute, where they have joined former street children and other needy and destitute youth to learn a trade.

donation to cover the plumbing costs and fee payments required to supply treated water from the Ghana Water Company to the Ayawaso campus.

On January 6, 2022, immediately after the trainees returned from their family visits over the Christmas holidays, AJ and some friends came back to the Ayawaso campus to join the trainees to clean the campus and do some farm work. More importantly, AJ and her team joined painters and the staff and trainees of HTI to complete the painting of the workshops. That same week, the team also bought art supplies to support the art program at HTI. In appreciation of all of AJ's generosity, the children presented a thank-you gift to AJ Johnson.

AJ and her friends are committed to supporting various projects to improve the quality of care and training we give to the young people living and training at HTI and we look forward to strengthening this partnership to benefit more young people in the future.

s we reported months ago, unlike the children at Fetteh who have their school close by, the children at our orphanage in Bongo go to school in Bolgatanga, 20 minutes' drive from the home. Once they all started going to school, we had to make arrangements with the owner of a small van to drive the children to school and back home. The condition of that vehicle left much to be desired and the daily rates were also high but we had little choice.

We are excited and grateful to report that Village Church of Christ in Hot Springs Village, Arkansas, has funded the purchase of a bus for the children of Hope Children's Place to solve the transport problems at Bongo and ensure the safety of the children. This also means that we can begin to admit more children into the homes at Bongo.
